**ASHTON** 

Central Parade assembles on Market Street (on the pedestrianised area

at the side of the market hall) at 9am and proceeds to Ashton Parish Church for a remembrance service at 9.45am. Afterwards the parade will reassemble on Stamford Street and proceeds to the main Ashton War Memorial via the telephone exchange roundabout and Mossley Road for a wreath laying ceremony at

10.45am.

Hurst Service in St John's Church at 9.30am followed by a procession

via Kings Road to the war memorial in Hurst Cemetery for a wreath laying ceremony and planting of personal poppies at

11am.

Park Bridge Service of remembrance at the war memorial in the grounds of

Park Bridge institute at 10.45am.

Waterloo Parade assembles at Cannon Burrows Primary School, Oldham

Road, at 2.15pm and proceeds to war memorial for a service of

remembrance at 2.30pm.

**DENTON** 

Central Parade assembles at 10am outside Denton West End Working

Men's Club, Grosvenor Street, and leaves at 10.10am proceeding via Grosvenor Street, Seymour Street, Manchester Road and Market Street to the remembrance garden where a wreath will be

laid.

Parade continues to Denton Town Hall. At 10.40am, the parade will proceed along Albert St, Stockport Road and Gould Street to the war memorial in Victoria Park for a service of remembrance at

10.45am. Service.

Haughton Green A service of remembrance will be held in St Mary's Church,

starting at 10.30am, followed by a short wreath laying ceremony

at the war memorial on the south side of the church.

**DROYLSDEN** 

Central Parade assembles on Church Street and departs at 10am

proceeding to Droylsden War Memorial for a remembrance service and wreath laying ceremony at 10.45am. Afterwards the parade will proceed to Villemomble Square for dismissal. Refreshments will be served in Guardsman Tony Downes House.

**DUKINFIELD** 

Central Parade assembles at the war memorial for a Remembrance

Service and wreath laying ceremony at 3pm. The parade will

return to the town hall, where refreshments will be served.

**HYDE** 

Central Parade assembles on Greenfield Street at 2pm for departure at

2.10pm proceeding in a loop to arrive back to the Town Hall for a remembrance service at 2.30pm. This will be followed by a wreath

laying ceremony at approximately 3.00pm.

Newton Parade leaves Rosemount Methodist Church, Bennett Street, at

9.45am and proceeds to the war memorial outside the George and Dragon, Bennett Street, for a short service of remembrance and wreath laying ceremony at 10.00am. The parade will return to

Rosemount Church via the same route.

Werneth Procession will assemble at Lower Higham Visitor Centre,

Higham Lane, leaving for the Werneth Low war memorial at

11.45am.

LONGDENDALE

Broadbottom Parade assembles at Broadbottom Community Centre, at 10.3am

and proceeds to the war memorial. An act of remembrance will be held at the war memorial at 10.45am. The parade will return to the

community centre by the same route

Hollingworth Remembrance service at Hollingworth Methodist Church at 10am

followed by parade to the war memorial, Mottram Moor, for a wreath laying ceremony at 10.50am and rededication of the War Memorial. The parade will return to St Mary's Church by the same

route.

Mottram A service of remembrance will be held in Mottram Parish Church

at 10.30pm.

**MOSSLEY** 

Central Service of remembrance and wreath laying ceremony to start at

10.45am at the war memorial in Mossley Park. Afterwards there will be a procession to The George Lawton Hall where light

refreshments will be available.

**STALYBRIDGE** 

Central Parade will assemble in Armentieres Square at 10.15am and will

proceed at 10.30am to Stalybridge War Memorial for a remembrance service and wreath laying ceremony at 10.55am. At the conclusion, the parade will return to Armentieres Square via Trinity Street. Light refreshments will be served in the civic hall.

## North Tameside District Climbing Wall



Our 7m NT Climbing Wall is back in action after its long holiday, it is ready for your Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, and Explorers to use on their section nights. It is set up at Ashton Fire Station and can be used any evening for your Scouts to climb, it has 4 automatic safety lines so they can't fall off. All you need is preferably 4 Permit 1 holders they just need to be able to put a harness on your Scouts and tell them the safety instructions we can train you on the night, but for a bit of homework first have a look at https://youtu.be/v5WpeMStpf0. If your Group is going to use it a few times ideally one Leader could get a Permit 2. Which is to erect the wall only, as all the leg base mountings are already set up, it only involves kicking the legs, connecting your car battery, then pressing the wall up

button. Also, you need to be able to climb the wall in case a Scout freezes at the top and won't let go, just nip up with your mallet, and bash their hands, oh sorry forgot risk assessments won't allow that anymore, I meant talk them down. We can do the Permit 2 training of erecting the wall and a rescue on the night.



# **News from HQ**

The ongoing uncertainty around the increasing cost of living is having a direct impact on Scouts. We all want to do what we can to make sure more young people have the opportunity to gain skills for life, and that no one misses out due to the cost.

#### **Cost of Living information hub**

Last week we launched new online guidance on the main cost of living hub. We'll update this and respond to trends and enquires we receive nationally, as well as asking you to share your experiences of the cost of living and how it's impacting your local experiences of Scouting. This page has some ideas about how to reduce costs and make your Group or Unit's money go further. We've heard some great examples of what you've been doing locally to support families. These examples include subsidising the cost of activities, offering flexible payments schedules to families who're struggling, a Group that has generated a small fund by leasing their meeting place, and Districts that are using reserves to subsidise the cost of the annual membership subscription fee. We've produced guidance for supporting our volunteers, and ideas to support with the costs of running Scouts locally including meeting places. We're aware that it's not just the young people who are impacted by increased costs, but volunteers may also be impacted. There are also cost pressures for running Scouts locally including increases in energy prices and the costs of other items from craft materials to food and other consumables. We're also planning to team up with Citizen's Advice to run a series of webinars over the next couple of months to provide more ideas on cost saving measures. We'll publish the dates and times of these on the events page once confirmed.

#### **Cost of Living Fund**

Nationally, we're aware of the impact of increasing costs and know there are some Groups, Districts, Counties/Areas/Regions who are unable to provide additional financial support to those in financial hardship. To try

and help those most impacted, we've created a Cost of Living Support Fund to make sure the young people most affected by rising costs are still able to take part in Scouts.

The fund is now open and will be accepting applications from Groups and Units on behalf of Scouts. You may need to contact parents/carers who you're aware are struggling to afford the costs of Scouts and let them know that there is support available. Applications need to be supported by the local District Commissioner. The closing date for applications to the fund will be Wednesday 23 November. You can read full guidance on the fund and how to apply online and sign up to a webinar on Tuesday 25 October at 7.30pm where we'll talk through the process and answer questions from leaders who are considering applying on behalf of families in their Group or Unit.

#### Thank you

Finally, we would just like to offer our heartfelt thanks for everyone who is doing all they can to find ways that support young people and fellow volunteers. We can all play a part in making sure that cost doesn't become a barrier to young people or volunteers enjoying and taking an active part in Scouts.

We're excited to launch the recruitment of our Contingent Management Team (CMT) for Roverway 2024.

#### **Share our recruitment pack**

We plan to send our largest ever UK Roverway Contingent to Norway. To support this endeavour, we're seeking six enthusiastic and creative volunteers to form our Contingent Management Team. These individuals will be key in shaping the event.

Please **share our recruitment pack** with leaders from across your county, area or region, and encourage them to get involved, ask questions and apply.

Recruitment of participants will launch early next year. We don't need you to do anything now but we'll soon be sharing more information about how patrols will be formed and ask every County (and equivalent) for an estimate around the number of patrols of 6-8 participants they could support. We have seen how much interest there is in these events and would like to open Roverway up to as many young people as possible.

## Roverway in a nutshell:

- It's an international Scouting event open to 16-22 year olds from across the world. For the UK, this crosses the boundary for the Explorer and Network Scout sections.
- It's hosted by a different European country each time, and was last held in 2018 in the Netherlands. The 2024 event will be in Norway.
- It's an opportunity for young people to explore a foreign country, and to do so with a clear programme, in-country support, and training so every participant has a unique experience.

## **Roverway consists of two main elements:**

- A path, where small groups of UK participants (working as a patrol) join other from across the world and embark on a five-day journey through the host country. Paths are designed to be shaped by the participants, making each young people's experience of Roverway unique.
- An international camp, in which thousands of young people gather together from across Europe (and beyond) to share experiences, build friendships and develop skills. The focus is very much on learning about themselves, those around them, and their place in the world.
